Our Need for Panties is Impossible to Quench

Fabienne Radi comes back with a series of short stories including reproductions of the works of art mentioned in the texts, as well as images found by the author.

Some people think that showing them off all the time is enough to win them goodwill. Others hide them because they're overwhelmed with worries. When you feel them, it's because there's a problem. Without them, we'd only be eating mocha yoghurt and we'd all have Auvergne accents. If you have the means, you can straighten them, align them, harmonise their shape, revive their colour, replace them with porcelain. When you're dead, they can still be used by police inspectors and archaeologists to indicate the approximate age of the body.

This book brings together an English performer, a Belgian nun, a dentist from the canton of Vaud, the Iceman, Shelley Duvall, Peter Pan and Harry Dean Stanton to discuss a singular part of the body.

Thirty-two stories with varying degrees of geometry and a more or less close connection with teeth...

A mongrel object, like the fruit of the love affair between a dachshund and an Afghan greyhound, this book offers a variety of forms and subjects: essays summoning personalities from pop culture, art and literature (Flannery O'Connor, Marina Abramović, Allen Ginsberg, Paul Thek, Dean Martin, Paul Newman), fictions fabricated from works by contemporary artists (Nina Childress, Jean-Luc Manz, Joëlle Flumet), poems cobbled together from found materials (personal development manuals, contemporary injunctions to happiness), and a confession letter from the author to her children about a pair of guinea pigs.

We take in the history of crooners and radiator problems, learn about mortuary visits, discover the formation of the Alps explained with military cover, and ponder the place of women combining vocals and drums in pop music.



Bruno meets Lou Masduraud at the Swiss Institute in Rome during a fellowship. He is a writer, she is a sculptor. They soon develop a mischievous complicity, a light-hearted yet profound friendship that blossomed in the summer heat, in discussions during the golden hour and in strolls through the Eternal City. Captivated by the way the artist looks at the world, the author records with wonder the relief she gives to what surrounds them.

Lou shares with him her affection for ancient stone, her thoughts on Fascist town planning and her fondness for baby seagulls. A privileged witness to a work in progress, Bruno retraces for us her artistic research, which follows the trail of water and marble from public Roman fountains through the twists and turns of history and power.

Bruno Pellegrino was born in Morges (Switzerland) in 1988. Winner of the Young Writer's Prize for his short story *L'idiot du village* (Buchet/Chastel, 2011), he published his first book, Comme Atlas (Zoé, 2015). Three years later, his novel *Là-bas*, août est un mois d'automne (Zoé) won the Prix des Libraires Payot, the Prix Alice Rivaz and the Prix Alain-Fournier.

In 2006, a 3-cubic-metre crate was placed in front of a charming villa built two decades earlier on the outskirts of Geneva. It had arrived from Mexico and contained a few pieces of furniture, art objects, paintings, drawings, engravings and thousands of photographs. This is the core of the archive of Eugenio Cornejo, born in Santiago de Chile in 1940 and died in Puebla, Mexico, in 2002.

Marisa Cornejo, his daughter, organised the rescue of her father's archive. Its contents reveal the sunny side of the exile that took the family from Chile to Mexico, via Argentina, Bulgaria and Belgium, in a world at the height of the Cold War. Filling in the gaps in her memory as a young girl, it enables her to construct a narrative out of what had hitherto been an unspeakable traumatic confusion.







A city girl who claims to be the author mixes her own memories of her first ski lessons and holiday flats rented by the family with those of an endearing fossil from time immemorial. All of the events that you will read have have been recorded in a notebook that contains the strands of several stories: the big one, that of the birth of the Alps, told by an eccentric guide; and the small one, that of the daily life of a group of hikers.

Nine days of walking punctuated by breathtaking land-scapes, inhumane effort (for a city-dweller), the weight of the bag and the promiscuity in the huts. The little group – an ecosystem in itself – gets on both well and badly, for the delight of the readers.

Waiting in a corridor, occupying a bath for two, filling up with petrol, taking over a dance floor: we know how to use these places and we comply. When, for one reason or another, this usage escapes us, however, a situation arises that is commonly referred to as "a moment of solitude", a slight departure from the norm.

Laurence Boissier has made this her speciality. By letting her memories of childhood, adolescence and mother-hood flood back, she takes note, in a completely subjective way, of these places, banal, abstract or improbable, which are so many supports for a lived experience. And we discover the obtuse helplessness of the woman who can't get out of the water on water skis, her endurance as a mother carrying her trolley to the supermarket like an ocean liner on the Panama Canal, her abandonment in the human mass of the crowded underground.





CÉLINE CERNY & LINE MARQUIS Fire and Birds – A Talisman for the World to Come

- A tender and hopeful tale for future generations

The dead are problematic for the living, their emptiness can take up an enormous amount of space. That's how Mathilde goes back to school, how her mother gets lost in the big marital bed and how her brother finds himself in the oversized suit of the head of the family. Fortunately, links are forged between living beings and the world we call inanimate. The father not only died, he was transformed. The void he has left is finally filled.

Divided into short scenes, the story progresses from the little school in Les Pâquis to the flat on Rue du Mont-Blanc, via the harbour and an unlikely museum. The protagonists of this small universe organise their presence in these volumes as best they can. Some places are completely unsuitable, others have to be completely reinvented, and sometimes you have to decide to explore new territory.

Faced with the latent anxiety provoked by the state of the world as it is reported to us, **Céline Cerny** and **Line Marquis** put together a book, a collection of incantations and images. In response to this blurred threat, fuelled by thousands of images and figures, projections of the collapse of our political, economic and social systems whose forms and temporality are unknown. They are endeavouring to counter the staging of this dystopia with a resilient imaginary world.

In a series of fragments addressed to her loved one, the narrator combines reflections on our link to the animal kingdom and our most distant past, on the hope of a fluidity of genres, on the place of imagination and the power of stories in our lives.







Line Marquis was born in

her artistic practice.









Hersperger's second astonishing novel brings the readers to the everyday betrayals of married life – but what if it was all a lie?




A man loses his wife after forty years together, even though it seems that no disagreement or external event has ever disturbed the harmony of their marriage. But the death upsets a balance that turns out to have been an artificial construct, fashioned to suit Huguette's destiny, but far removed from the personality of the man who chooses to be called Mortimer.

Charles Hersperger's precise, infinitely subtle and singular writing makes it possible to immerse oneself in and follow as closely as possible the metamorphosis, initially interior, all nuances, but no less radical, which will lead the widower into terra incognita and towards a new life.




Anne Cuneo

Anne Cuneo (1936–2015) was a filmmaker, writer of literary and documentary pieces and journalist who has excelled in the art of autobiographical narrative, documentary books, theatre and poetry, not to mention novels. She first wrote a cycle of autobiographical novels, among which *Gravé au diamant*. Published in 1967, it was a huge success with both critics and the general public, marking the beginning of the author's life as a writer. It was eventually awarded the Anti-Prix de la Radio suisse romande in 1979.

The author then explored historical fiction with *Garamond's Master*, making it her own: a story anchored in reality but able to take liberties with it to highlight certain aspects. She kept on writing a series of crime novels firmly rooted in our social realities

Anne Cuneo received the Schiller Prize, the Cultural Prize of the Canton of Zurich in 1981, the Bourse littéraire Prize of the City of Zurich in 1988 and, finally, in 1994, the Prix des auditeurs de la Première, as well as the Grand Prix vaudois de la création for her body of work.



Zurich, Spring 1963, a day in the life of Lise, an editor in an advertising agency. Her wounded soul, her 'atrophied psyche', she tries to heal it by delving into her past: the death of her father when she was only 9 years old, the successive religious boarding schools that were more prisons than schools, her arrival in Switzerland with everything to prove, her lack of experience with love, the multiple attempts at writing... until her personal emancipation.

Anne Cuneo's first published title, an autobiographical novel inspired by André Breton's Nadja, dotted with essential social issues was so well received that the Radio Suisse Romande created a prize for it.





Garamond's Master

A highly-researched novel that retraces the creation of the famous Garamond font in the sixteenth century, a time when erudites walked Europe's raods in search of knowledge.

'Anna' was eleven years old when she saw Lausanne for the first time. A Milanese girl from a good family who had lost her father three years earlier in atrocious circumstances. She was raised by her mother and lived for a long time in a sad boarding house for Italian girls. It was in Catholic School that Anne Cuneo blossomed. She learned French better than anyone else, became interested in literature, lost her faith and discovered the need to travel.

In this second opus of her life story, originally intended to be a private confession, Anne Cuneo gives us access to the last years of her childhood.

On the evening of 24 December 1534, a man suspected of heresy was hanged in Paris, Place Maubert: Antoine Augereau, printer, publisher and punchcutter. His body and books were then burned. He was accused, as a scapegoat, of being the author and printer of the anti-catholic Placards (posters).

Antoine Augereau created and passed on the typefaces that have – directly or indirectly – shaped those we still use today. His story is told by the most famous of his apprentices, Claude Garamond, who simultaneously tells his own.



This book sets out to denounce dead ends and false trails, while presenting a number of paths inspired by the ideas of degrowth


Ecology is everywhere. Organic products, "green" initiatives, "sustainable" projects, "eco-gestures"... We are being made aware, made to feel responsible. We are also being repressed and made to feel guilty. So sometimes we try to take action. For the climate, against pollution, for biodiversity. And yet our ecological impact - and Switzerland's in particular - continues to grow. In an increasingly mobile, connected and dependent world, is this really surprising?

The crisis is not just ecological; it is also – and above all – social and economic, political and democratic, philosophical and anthropological. It is becoming increasingly clear that the disasters we are witnessing at various levels are linked, and that their roots lie precisely in our modern, ever–growing societies.

Based on in-depth articles and concrete proposals published in the journal Moins! over the last decade, it outlines alternative paths to a liveable, convivial future.

Chinese Women in Switzerland

This first study of Chinese women's migration to Switzerland takes a gender perspective, while adopting a feminist, intersectional and transnational approach to analyse the unequal power relations that arise in the migratory lives of Chinese women in Switzerland.

Today, statues, busts and street names are the subject of protest, demands and militant action. The place of memorial markers in the public space is being questioned from an anti-racist, decolonial or feminist perspective. This questioning is the expression of a societal evolution, directed towards a form of recognition of wounded and invisible memories in line with current vision and values. The result is a reflection on the future of monuments and odonyms.

This book looks at how these media and political debates are brought into schools. Experiments are carried out in the classroom to integrate these current issues into the history of slavery, colonisation, gender relations and the labour movement. The aim is to raise awareness of the historical facts, but also to examine the construction of these memories. In this way, pupils are encouraged to debate, to develop their agentivity and to train themselves to become enlightened or committed citizens.

L'Équipe de didactique de l'histoire et de la citoyenneté (History and Citizenship
Teaching Team, ÉDHICE), at the
University of Geneva, to which all
the authors of the book belong,
has carried a collective project.
Its theme was developed as
part of a research seminar for
secondary school history teachers in training.


By showing the difficulties they encounter in their daily lives, in connection with the social and cultural change that their migration entails, this book illustrates how gender dynamics and personal and family relationships evolve in the migration process.

As the analyses show, migration is a process of socialisation through the family, work and interpersonal social networks at local and transnational level, in which these Chinese women become players. They have the ability to define the contours of both their identity and the social relationships they maintain with others, by giving meaning to their actions.

Finally, this book gives readers a panorama of the rich life stories of these Chinese women living in Switzerland, through numerous personal accounts in which they talk about the power relationships they face, and the various forms of discrimination linked to the intersection of gender, race, class, nationality or origin.




Yali Chen is a sociologist with a doctorate in gender studies and is a lecturer at the University of Geneva. Her research interests include transnationalism, online diaspora and the politics of migration. She is also interested in social and political issues in China, particularly with regard to gender issues, the Chinese political system and China's role in economic, political and social relations between countries in the North and South.

What are the situations experienced by people directly affected by assisted suicide in Switzerland? Through its descriptive dimension, this book makes a unique and original contribution to understanding a social issue that is often debated in the media.



NELLY VALSANGIACOMO & JON MATHIEU (DIR.) Sensitive Landscapes –Touch, Taste, Listen, Feel, See the Alps

How does it feel to be in the Alps? How do they taste? Do they form a special world of smells and scents? And what can we say about the auditory and visual impressions of this landscape?

This book offers an insight into the realities of assisted suicide. It is based on an ethnographic study that captures the views of those who seek such assistance, as well as those of the individuals likely to be involved in the process: people seeking assisted suicide and their families, those working for assisted-suicide associations, doctors, psychiatrists, nursing staff, pharmacists, police officers, forensic doctors, prosecutors and funeral directors.

With force and detail, it gives an account of the entire set-up of an assisted suicide and documents in an unprecedented way – based on direct observations – the actual carrying out of an assisted suicide and the entire medico-legal procedure that follows. The book recounts a series of cases, some of which were followed for almost two years, in an attempt to understand how the idea of wanting to give death such a form emerged in a person – right through to its implementation. The book offers as comprehensive an understanding as possible of the system of assisted suicide in Switzerland.

Alexandre Pillonel is doctor in sociology, and Marc-Antoine Berthod. They are both at the Health and Social Research Laboratory at the University of Applied Sciences for Social Work and Health Lausanne, respectively as a research associate and as a professor and codean. Dolores Angela Castelli Dransart has a doctorate in literature and is a professor at the Haute école de travail social de Fribourg.

Anthony Stavrianakis has a doctorate in anthropology and is a research fellow at the Centre national de la recherche scientifique and a member of the Laboratoire d'ethnologie et de sociologie comparative.

This book takes readers on a journey through the Alps as perceived by the senses, past and present. Over the last few decades, scientific and social interest in the wealth of human perceptions has grown. The issue of the environment, which is becoming directly observable, has also contributed to this. Political and cultural players in the Alpine region are responding creatively to environmental changes and new ways of seeing things.

On a moving island in Lake Chad, the author invents a utopian society that could lay the foundations of a project that, following in the footsteps of Achille Mbembe, we might call 'Afropolitan'. 'Afropolitan'. However, the price of this utopia is that of isolation and a dangerous ignorance of the torments of history and the of today's African nation-states.



Nétonon Noël Ndjékéry was born in Moundoun, Chad, and began his writing career with his first short story, published by Radio-France Internationale. Since then, he has lived on the shores of Lake Geneva in Switzerland. He has written six novels. In 2017, he was awarded the Grand Prix Littéraire National du Tchad for his body of work.

One evening, the young Bendiman's father, a diplomat, is called back from Switzerland to Chad with the whole family. But at Ndjamena airport, a black car takes his parents away, while he finds himself in a car driven by an uncle. The next day, he learns that his father and mother have been arrested and held incommunicado for 'reasons of state'.

Bendiman then embarks on a quest to get his parents out of prison in a country he knows nothing about, a country in civil war and reeling from a massive influx of petrodollars, a country where the law has never really left the books to enter people's daily lives.

Nétonon Noël Ndjékéry narrates the adventures of a Chadian child who grew up in Geneva and was nourished by the mythologies of the good little Helvetians: William Tell, the Motherland, the Red Cross and much more. Halfway between a fairytale and a tale of initiation, Bendiman is the unwilling hero of a ride through languages and moral imaginations.





Tor the essayist, critic and man of culture Jean Starobinski, the history of medicine lies at the exact crossroads between his training and his interests as a doctor, literary critic and historian of ideas and science. As a philosopher, he dreamed of a history without frontiers, one that would link the different fields of knowledge – literature, the arts, the sciences, philosophy and medicine – a history in which he proved to be one of the most eminent specialists of his century.

In this book, he draws on these different disciplines, demonstrating with remarkable coherence the way in which they have been mutually nourished in the development, over the centuries, of the figure of the doctor, of all the diagnostic and therapeutic means at his disposal, and of the nature of the bond that unites him with the patient. In so doing, he invites us to embrace a philosophy that addresses the fundamental values of our existence, and to take a critical look at medicine, suggesting that it 'will only make us happier if we know exactly what to ask of it'.



A student of literature and medicine, Jean Starobinski earned a doctorate in both disciplines. He turned out to be an eclectic thinker, admiring the Enlightenment, which he never ceased to study and whose ideal of humanist thought he embodied. A teacher of the history of ideas and medicine, he is the author of numerous works in the fields of philosophy, art criticism, the history of ideas and psychiatry. He died in Morges on 4 March 2019, aged 98.

From September 1944 onwards, Alice Rivaz wrote a series of investigative articles for the weekly Servir about women's occupations. In them, she described the working conditions of housekeepers and home workers, and reported on their experiences. The tone of these articles is resolutely empathetic: the aim, as the title of the series indicates, is to 'listen to those who work', in other words to those whose voices are scarcely heard or considered. Rivaz is not content to present the stories of women's working lives in an unbiased way; she becomes involved in the portraits of the women she meets, showing them what they do and how they do it. She also questions them about the more material aspects of their tasks (activities, use of time, quantified income, family budget, etc.), seeking to bring to light the material reality of their precarious occupations.

Alice Rivaz experimented with different forms of writing and confronted the political and social issues that were to recur in most of her books: the working-class condition, the social question, war, women's suffrage, and the situation of women in the world of letters.



Alice Rivaz (1901–1998) is a major figure in twentieth-century French-language literature. She wrote a considerable body of work, deeply rooted in her own century. From 1959, she devoted herself fully to her writing, focusing on themes close to her: women, work, solitude and literature. Several of her books have won major awards and have been translated into German and Italian.





What could be more iconoclastic than a herbarium compiled within four walls, without the expanse of nature? As well as a few flowers and weeds gleaned from the prison courtyard, Rosa Luxemburg received letters from her close friends containing dried specimens or bouquets of fresh flowers that she herself pressed. Rosa Luxemburg never ceased to encourage those close to her to keep up their joie de vivre and cheerfulness, while the clouds she glimpsed through a barred window took on the colours of war and steel.

About the editor: **Muriel Pic** is the author of documentary stories and poems, critical essays, experimental films and collages. In 2010 she published *Les désordres de la biblio-thèque*, an essay with photographic montages, followed by *Élégies documentaires* in 2016 and the story *En regardant le sang des bêtes* in 2017. *Affranchissements* (Seuil, 2020) received a special mention in the Prix Wepler and was nominated for the Prix Medicis essai.



Rosa Luxemburg remains a major figure in the revolutionary socialist movement. Born in 1871 in a Polish town, she went into exile in Switzerland to study. Opposed to Lenin on the question of centralisation and armed insurrection, she campaigned to bring about revolution by raising the consciousness of the working class. She spent the First World War in prison, writing letters of unparalleled lyricism and intelligence.

Following in the footsteps of the popular French novel *Le Tour de la France par deux enfants*, Daniel de Roulet has also followed the rivers and the Atlantic coast where the 56 reactors still in service in France are built. He learns about the history of each site, documents the saga of the pioneers of nuclear power, and recounts the feats of the engineers as well as the risks for the people living near these concrete monsters – not forgetting the charm of the landscapes.

But the enthusiasm for industry that the two children showed in the 19th century is no longer possible today. Since the end of the last century, no new power stations have been commissioned in France, and work on the Flamanville EPR, promised for 2012, has been plagued by problems. Before the great white plumes at the top of the cooling towers disappear one day, Daniel de Roulet takes an inventory in situ, a critical stroll through the age of the atom, more necessary than ever.









A genius at making up stories, the author reveals the characteristics of the 'grain of tobacco', the 'beast of Gévaudan', the 'straw horse', the 'emerald', the 'minus' and the 'mackerel verrat'. Sometimes these beasts, microscopic or monstrous, emerge from extravagant situations of great humour. But most of the texts are simple descriptions of the animals, describing their nature and habits with good humour and precision. Giono's tone is tongue-in-cheek, and makes light of academic discourse.

The 19 texts that make up the book were written between 1956 and 1965, as entertainment while Giono was working on his major novels. He amused himself by supplementing them with a series of quotations (most of them invented from scratch) under the title *marginalia*. Like Borges in Fictions, Giono is a storyteller, one who loves to muddy the waters and lose the reader in the vertigo of paradox..



Close to the craftsman and far removed from the Parisian publishing world, **Jean Giono** (1895–1970) stood out from the rest of the French literary scene. A bank clerk by necessity, he left this post after the success of *Colline* in 1929. A profound pacifist, he suffered through both wars. A poet of a certain peasantry, a painter of character, a chronicler of the Alps and Italy, he travelled little until 1950.







Paul Savioz is a young, bored man. In search of incandescence and inner adventure, he sets off to complete his studies in Paris, where he discovers heaven and hell. But he is slow to realise that he will have to choose between these two realms, for his own salvation or for his own ruin. It will take him a long time and many encounters to remember that human life may have meaning, and that it is not in man's nature to be content with the world or with time.

Meeting and debating with his friends - Justin, Guillaume, Françoise and – he eventually goes back to Switzerland as a transformed man: gentle, pensive and sombre, who no longer believes in anything but despairs of it. From being lost, Paul Savioz becomes the guide. But isn't it presumptuous to hope to save anyone? Is human love enough to restore hope?

The Hunting of the Deer isn't a novel of love - it is a novel of absolute love. For it has no other task today than to remind mankind that there is no escape from the infinity of his soul or the eternity of his destiny.

La Baconnière

Founded in 1927 by Hermann Hauser, À la **Baconnière** was Very active in the Swiss literary field of the 1930s (comparable to Skira in art publishing), and started to weigh on the European intellectual scene at the end of the Second World War. As a spiritual resistance over Nazism and in order to create a refuge for free thought, La Baconnière developed the Cahiers du Rhône collection in 1942, under the drive of Albert Béguin. During the war, this collection thus succeeded in supporting the struggle of French writers for France's values at the heart of a threatened Europe by publishing works of Charles Péguy, Louis Aragon, Jean Cassou, Paul Claudel, Paul Éluard, Loys Masson, Pierre Jean Jouve, St-John Perse, Jean Cayrol or Jules Supervielle.

La Baconnière soon became pivotal in the definition of a Swiss and European carrefour for the intellectual and literary life, publishing Denis de Rougemont's federalists essays and writings from the Geneva school of authors: Jean Starobinski, Michel Jeanneret, John E. Jackson. A new poetry collection, La Mandragore qui chante was created in the early 1970s. It published texts by Pierre Emmanuel amongst others. A philosophy collection, Être et penser, also had its glory hour when it printed Jeanne Hersch, Vladimir Jankélévitch and Maine de Biran.

With nearly 1,500 titles in its catalogue (250 in stock) covering all fields of thought history, from philosophy to literary and musical criticism to Fine Arts, La Baconnière undoubtedly contributed to the development of the Swiss intellectual identity of the 20th century, publishing the texts of the famous "Rencontres Internationales de Genève".

After three decades of inactivity, Laurence Gudin bought La Baconnière in December 2011. The new house remains faithful to its historical focus on quality of its timeless essays and works of fiction. It is currently reviving parts of its historical collection: the most relevant authors whose titles are now out of print are reissued, such as recently Le monde du silence by philosopher and poet Max Picard.

The "Languages" collection was rekindled in 2012 under the direction of Professor Daniel Sangsue of the University of Neuchâtel. It has already welcomed eminent names (Jean-François Louette, Philippe Hamon, Philippe Dufour, etc.) for literary criticism outside the framework of academic didactic essays.

In the field of fiction, La Baconnière publishes French-speaking Swiss writers of different generations, such as André Ourednik, Florian Eglin or Raluca Antonescu, whose often very distant worldviews provides a large cultural scope. Two collections of foreign literature, "80 mondes" and "Ibolya Virág", contain a selection of works previously inedited in French which impacted on the 20th century and nourished European intellectuals. It has also been translated fiction since 2012 by promoting some of the great voices that have built contemporary European literature, such as the poetic lines of the Italian Anita Pittoni, the wonderful naturalistic stories of the Scottish Kathleen Jamie or the corrosive tone of Serguei Dovlatov's Russian works.



During the final journey to the Moon in December 1972, the Apollo 17 crew took the famous *Blue Marble* photograph on the film NN (November November). It was the first image of a perfectly round Earth, and had a profound and lasting impact on our common imagination.

This documented account tells the story of both the lunar missions and the development of space photography, and places us side-by-side the astronaut-photographers of the Apollo 17 mission.

This short essay also looks at the critical reception of *Blue Marble*, which was sometimes naive or self-serving, and puts it into context by reproducing all 170 photographs from the film NN.



Alexandre Chollier lives in Geneva. A geographer and writer, he is the author of numerous contributions at the crossroads of geography and literature. Jura, 1911. A woman despairs of becoming pregnant again and superstitiously goes to a place called Le Gouffre du diable to beg for an end to her pregnancy. Based on this place, whose terrifying true story is told to us, and on this common ancestress, Raluca Antonescu weaves together four portraits of ordinary women who are going through great trials and whose lives intertwine, and sometimes tear each other apart.

This family fresco, which spans almost a century (from 1911 to 2007), follows the evolution of relationships with domesticated nature. We move from a rural life in the Jura to the housing estates of the 1960s, and then to a purely urban life.

At the crossroads of nature writing and feminism, this text, written in a sensory way - with a particular emphasis on the sense of touch - has a very contemporary feel.

Three key moments reveal the symbolic power of monsters in Russia: in the 18th century, the Kunstkamera, considered to be the first Russian museum, exhibited anatomical monsters – live or in jars – side by side with exotic animals and scientific and technical discoveries. In the 19th century, monstrous–looking creatures were exhibited at popular fairs and other entertainment venues, making a profound mark on the city culture of the time. Finally, at the turn of the 20th century, with the meteoric rise of medicine and the life sciences.

The author focuses on the pivotal years in Russia's cultural and social history, namely the first third of the 20th century, revisiting this monstrous past in depth. At a time when a new society was being built and the past was being wiped clean, what role did the monsters play in relation to the 'new man' and the 'woman of tomorrow'? To answer this question, the author explores various texts by Mikhail Bulgakov, Vladimir Mayakovsky, Mikhail Ossorgin, Andrei Platonov and Yevgeny Zamiatin. The extreme diversity of monsters to be found in the literature of the period sheds new light on the complexity of the relationship with the Other in Russia, then and now.




Annick Morard is a specialist in Russian literature and culture. She was a lecturer at the University of Geneva and a research associate at the Institute of Russian Literature (Pushkin House) in St Petersburg, where she investigated monsters and the monstrous between 2014 and 2016.


This collection brings together previously unpublished articles by Jean-Pierre Richard, assembled to commemorate the 100th anniversary of his birth. The articles are representative of the practice of this great literary critic: some comment on his own work ('On Thematic Critique', 'Some new aspects of literary criticism in France'), while others bear witness to his links with the École de Genève. They are followed by interviews given at the time of the publication of *Terrains de lecture* and *Quatre lectures*, as well as early articles published in the journal Fontaine. The collection also includes some curious 'Notes on crime fiction', a note on Céline and a micro-reading of a passage from Flaubert's *Voyage en Orient*.
